Cultivating Restorative Economies

As a global society, many have recognized that our current economic and agricultural models do not provide for a stable, sustainable, and equitable future. As we continue to face times of social, political, ecological, and economic unpredictability, many are pursuing alternatives that better serve our communities and work toward a more resilient planet.

We often discuss the economic viability of farms and ranches as something that is separate from conservation and restoration, but what if economic and ecological resilience are one and the same? Applying ecological principles to economic systems helps us reframe our production models so that all we do has the potential to be restorative. We can look to nature to guide and rebuild broken human systems and restructure them to be more balanced and therefore, more equitable and just. We no longer accept that economic growth must come at the expense of the environment and want to collectively redefine agriculture and our relationship with nature.

At REGENERATE 2022 we will discuss these challenges and more, inviting our community to learn, collaborate, and contribute to this conversation at local, national, and global scales.

Community Agreements

- Take care of yourself. Stay hydrated. Consider stepping outside. Quiet rooms are available upstairs (except before and during roundtables), feel free to step away. Be gentle with yourself.
- Practice Confident Humility the self-awareness that we all have wisdom and other assets, and we will always have more to learn.
- Consider listening if you talk often; If you often listen quietly, consider speaking up.
- Listen actively and with an ear to understanding others' views.
- In conversations, speak YOUR truth try using "I-statements", speak from your experience
- Avoid assumptions about any member of the group or generalizations about social groups. Don't ask individuals to speak for their (perceived) social group. Everyone is infinitely complex, embrace and assume their fullness and uniqueness and all the things you do not know about them.
- Commit to learning, not debating. Comment in order to share information, not to persuade.
- Embrace paradox we humans are naturally contradictory. You will hear things that you might not agree with, or concepts that contradict one another. Lean into the discomfort and look for the emerging questions. We'll walk away with more questions than answers, and that's okay!
- Embrace relationship as resolution if there is an issue that can't be resolved, focus more on the relationship than the issue lean into that.

The roundtables will be facilitated by staff, speakers, volunteers and contributors.

The goals of the roundtables are to:

- build relationships between participants and speakers/contributors around topics they care about
- learn from the wealth of knowledge and experience that everyone brings to Regenerate
- deepen participants' understanding of where they themselves and other people are coming from
- interact with and ask questions of speakers/contributors
- create momentum and inspire collective

1. Funneling the money where it matters

Facilitated by speakers Jessica Chiartas and Mariela Cedeño, and HMI's Programs Manager Marie Von Ancken

Truly regenerative agriculture nourishes soil, ecosystems, and people, particularly those most marginalized. Financial support, and the shifting of capital and power, is necessary to advance truly regenerative and just agriculture. In this roundtable we'll discuss moving capital in a way that supports resilient food systems, collectively builds truly equitable models of investment and economic opportunity, and supports regenerative practices on the ground.

2. Impact of federal policy on-the-ground, and how we can influence it

Facilitated by speakers Linda Faillace, Sarah Carden, and Judith McGeary, and Quivira's Carbon Ranch Planner Katherine Ottmers

From the Farm Bill to USDA loans and technical assistance, there are many ways producers receive Federal support, though it's not always easy! Join this conversation to learn from speakers, and from one another, about the challenges, opportunities, and visions for how we can leverage Federal resources and assistance.

3. Developing Drought Tolerant Cover and Forage Seed for the Southwest

Facilitated by Facilitated by Richard Pratt (NMSU Cropping Systems Research Program), Timothy Vos (Southwest Grain Collaborative), and Quivira's Executive Director Sarah Wentzel-Fisher

Years into a megadrought, communities across the Western US are considering how to localize drought resilience to fit their particular needs. Join to learn about the research to adapt drought resilient cover crop and forage species for Southwest climates, and discuss questions about how natural systems can support producers in their goals.

4. Giving voice to nature through data

Facilitated by speaker Dorn Cox and OpenTEAM fellows Genna Fudin and Sara Legg

We'll discuss how we can expand our commonwealth of agricultural knowledge towards new economies of abundance, and how we can all participate in regeneration through the largest open science project in history. Furthermore we'll discuss the role data plays and how to both increase access while protecting the data sovereignty of marginalized populations.

Roundtable Sessions

5. New paradigms, new tools: rethinking rangeland conservation

Facilitated by speakers Mark Biaggi and Coley Burgess, and HMI's Executive Director Wayne Knight

To regenerate land, revitalize communities, and foster social equity, requires a paradigm shift. When we change how we conceive of land stewardship, numerous new tools and frameworks become available to us, as well as methods for adapting the tools and frameworks we already have. We'll discuss the Safe to Fail Method, silvopasture, biochar, grazing, and whatever else participants want to share about their evolving paradigms and tools.

6. Alternative economic approaches to food sovereignty and justice

Facilitated by speakers LaRae Wiley, Beth Robinette, and Phil Warsaw, and Quivira's Education Manager Leah Potter-Weight

We want to hear from you about creative economic models, business structures, and land arrangements to foster food sovereignty and justice! Join to discuss the demystification of LandBack, as well as creative collaborations and tools in real places, like food hubs, that actively dismantle racism rather than reinforce it.

7. Triple Bottom Line: Supporting profit, people, and planet with producer-owned collaboratives and more

Facilitated by the Rocky Mountain Food Collaborative's Alicia Boyd, Margaret S. McRoberts, Katie Miller, Lance Wheeler and Dustin Downey

Join us in discussing Rocky Mountain Food Collaborative's concept for a producer owned, vertically integrated regional supply chain, including a producer owned grocery store, butcher counter, USDA wholesale/retail cut facility, sandwich shop & steakhouse. In this model, producers take home more for the food they produce and everyone in the community has access to regenerative food. How can such models strengthen producers' collective voice in policy, and access to technical assistance and grants?

8. Re-visioning the family farm

Facilitated by speakers Sarah Mock and Oliver Chedgey, and Quivira's CEWL Manager CJ Ames

All too often we see small family farms fail, or barely scrape by financially, yet we repeat old patterns. What will it take to build farms and ranches that are financially successful, ethical for everyone involved, and regenerative? We'll hear from a producer in a non-traditional farm agreement, and a farm researcher about why small family farms fail and what we can do about it (hint: big team farming). And we want to hear your stories of success, and challenge, and how you're creatively navigating agriculture within systems that weren't built to support producers.

9. Young agrarians: Living the questions now and seeking bold solutions

Facilitated by New Agrarian Program Apprentice Speakers, and Staff from Quivira's NAP Program

The familiar quote of Ranier Marie Rilke, "Be patient towards all that is unresolved in your heart and try to love the questions themselves," inspires this roundtable of 2nd year New Agrarian apprentices as they share their questions, hopes, concerns, and visions for the future. Bring your own questions, hopes, and concerns about human-centered, inclusive, restorative partnerships, land access models, and food systems.

10. Cultivating Holistic Wellness Among Agricultural Producers

Facilitated by RMFU AgWell's LeeAnne Sanders

The agricultural profession is among the most stressful careers in the US. With constant pressure, often from factors outside of their control, America's agricultural communities are suffering from skyrocketing rates of suicide, substance abuse, and other behavioral health struggles. Join us in a round table discussion on the stressors facing today's farmers and ranchers, as well as a collaborative conversation around how to best build grassroots networks of support for this important population.

7 STEPS TO BECOME A CERTIFIED AGA PRODUCER

1) DOWNLOAD DOCUMENTS

Download the Membership and Certification Submission Checklist to help guide you through the process. Download a copy of the Ruminant, Pastured Pork or Dairy Standards. Please make sure to read them thoroughly and if any questions remain, please email us at standards@americangrassfed.org.

2) AGA MEMBERSHIP

can fill out a membership form online or download one and send it in. Please note that we are unable to process any inspection forms without a current membership PRIOR to scheduling and submitting an inspection.

3) FARM INSPECTION

If you have other certifications, such as organic or state or local programs, we can work with that inspector for ruminant and pastured pork to do the AGA on-farm inspection at the same time, and they will advise you as to the cost (if any) of the bundled inspections. Dairy inspectors must have completed an

IOIA course.

Once you choose a company or person to conduct the inspection, the inspector must contact AGA for a link to the proper online inspection form. If you can't find an inspector in your area, please email us at standards@americangrassfed.org.

4) INSPECTION SUBMITTED TO AGA

Once the inspection is completed, the inspector must submit the information via the instructions on the form.

5) CERTIFICATION COMMITTEE REVIEW

Our Certification Committee will review all submitted paperwork. Once they determine that you qualify for Certified AGA Producer status, AGA will send you paperwork to complete the process.

6) AGA LICENSING AGREEMENT

Sign and return the licensing agreement, that you will be sent, along with payment to AGA. You must send AGA a copy of your label for our files. Upon receipt of the signed documents, label, and payment, AGA will issue your certification. Once you are approved and licensed, you can use the AGA Grassfed logo on your labels and promotional materials.

And remember, if you see that logo being used on products you doubt meet the AGA standards, please tell us! Together, we will maintain the integrity of the AGA brand, the original, oldest and USA-only grassfed certification in the United States.






